Orthopaedics vs. orthopedics

You've probably noticed that different clinics and hospitals spell our specialty two different ways. Have you ever wondered why?

According to Bruce Fauré, MD, our department chairperson, “The mission of Aurora Advanced Orthopaedics is to provide orthopaedic care in the very best traditions of our specialty.”

Nicolas Andry, a French physician and significant contributor to the early history of orthopaedics, introduced the name in his 1741 book *Orthopaedia*. Andry explains that he formed his book's title out of two Greek words: *orthos*, which signifies straight, and *pais*, which means a child. “Out of these two words I have compounded that of Orthopaedia,” which describes the special care provided to children (and adults) with needs of the human anatomy, skeletal structure and growth, along with instructions for correcting deformity.

Dr. Fauré reminds us that orthopaedics truly focuses on the whole person and all of their musculoskeletal needs (just as we at Aurora Advanced Orthopaedics do), while the word *orthopedics* is derived from the Latin words for straight (*ortho*) and foot (*pedis*). “Tradition matters, words matter. There is no need to modernize the word that describes what we do. We hold true to and take pride in our traditions and honor those that come before us, as well as the patients that we treat today.”

Fun fact

While the adult skeleton contains 206 bones, the skeleton of an infant contains 350 (our bones fuse together as we grow). And more than half of your 206 bones are found in your hands and feet!
